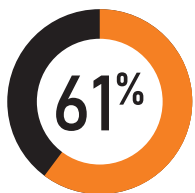

Princeton is consistently ranked among the top universities in the country and the world. We are a major research institution with the heart of a liberal arts college, which means our students receive unparalleled opportunities to work with faculty who are leaders in their fields. Small classes and a 5:1 student-faculty ratio allows students to form strong academic relationships with their professors. Undergraduate research—with faculty and on your own—is central to a Princeton degree.

Our financial aid program is the best in its class. Research shows that many high-achieving, low-income students don't apply to selective colleges like Princeton because they think the cost is prohibitive. This isn't true.

In fact, for students from low-income families, Princeton typically costs less than most state universities, community colleges, or smaller liberal arts schools.

If you come from a background of modest financial means, you can expect your need to be met completely by Princeton's aid program. About 61% of our students receive financial aid, which is awarded through grants, not loans. Eighty-three percent of recent seniors graduated debt free.
